Tribal Justice follows two extraordinary Native American women, both chief judges for their tribes' courts: Abby Abinanti, Chief Judge of the Yurok Tribe on the northwest coast of California, and Claudette White, Chief Judge of the Quechuan Tribe in the southeastern desert near Yuma, California. Basing restorative justice practices on ancient traditional methods of resolving disputes, they create ways for offenders to right wrongs and restore balance to the community.

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
